Der unkle I take this opitnity of riting you a few line to let you know that we are all well at this time and I hope that thes few lines may find you all in joying the same blesing We hav had a verry fine fall this year Christmas is nearly her but idont her much sed about it this year & unkkle haris tomson foke was well the last i herd from them & wheat is worth 1 doler her this year and corn is worth 1 doler her and everthing els in po shan we are still caring on the buggy shop yeit I my self I still work the farm I had wan brother in the shop tha hav bin a good minny move from this Country this year sum from our one settlement this fall it has been verry helty her this year old mis woodside is stil living yeit and can work about the house and yard she looks like she mit live for sevel years yeit. I think hav rote all that i can think of if i knew what you wantid to her i wood rite it freelly but i dont know what it wood be it has bin so long sinc i rote to you that i reckin that you think that I had forgot you but i dont think that i will ever forgit you while i live I hav so minny to rite to that i cant rite to all mo than wonc or twice ayer so i wont you to excuse me

I got a letter from unkkle Loper and i hav for gotin the name of the post office and i wont you to send the name of it to me and i will rite to them and to I wood like to see you all verry much but i reckon i shant never see you all but i wont you to rite to me and dont do like i hav dun i wont you to rite to me as sune as you git this and i will rite agin and tel unkkle Loppers foks to rite to me and i will rite to them I want to her from all of my cin wans more.

our Cuntry is getting so old and scarce of news I scarsly know what to write most all the people that you left here is ded or moved away there is but few here that you know Thomas Peden the Gunsmith is ded Mager Berry is Ded I heard to Day old Samuel Baker is Ded Nancy Baker is Ded Wilsin Baker is still living at the same plase and old Mrs Woodside and that is about all the old nabors that is left that you ware aquanted with I had like not to have thout of uncle Sipio getting quite feable and Eldan and Betty Stinises & Robert Peden Samuel Ramsy is stil alive

We still have peas and plenty and that is all we can expect I still live at the _____ plase i am still trying to make a living I have sold the old home plase and baut more above me I some times think of moving to the west but I have not gone yet I dont know what I may do I can make a living here yet with industry and it is about as plesant a country to live in as anny I can here of as yet pcrhaps ther is plases where a person cold make a living with more ease but I have got to believe that a person sees as mutch satisfaction to be imployed as to live in idleness or at least I have found it so

we still have preaching Pisgay we have two preachers on this serkit this next yeare we have a good Church there now and we have Divison of the suns of temperance there also with a good many suns and dauters in it. There is a class of people in the north they call
